mitten	<i>common plural</i>	<i>noun,</i>	hand covering separating thumb from fingers
hold on		<i>Interjection</i>	stop, wait
scarf	<i>common singular</i>	<i>noun,</i>	a long narrow piece of cloth worn around the neck
ear muff	<i>common plural</i>	<i>noun,</i>	a warm tubular covering for the ears
honey	<i>common singular</i>	<i>noun,</i>	name you call someone you love
hat	<i>common singular</i>	<i>noun,</i>	head covering

### Supplementary Vocabulary

snowsuit	<i>common singular</i>	<i>noun,</i>	a one- or two-piece outer garment for cold weather, often consisting of heavily lined pants and jacket
gloves	<i>common plural</i>	<i>noun,</i>	hand covering separating all fingers and thumb

<b>coat</b>	<i>common singular</i>	<i>noun,</i>	an outer garment with sleeves, covering at least the upper part of the body
<b>mitts</b>	<i>common plural</i>	<i>noun,</i>	short for mittens
<b>boots</b>	<i>common plural</i>	<i>noun,</i>	a covering of leather, rubber, or the like, for the foot and all or part of the leg
